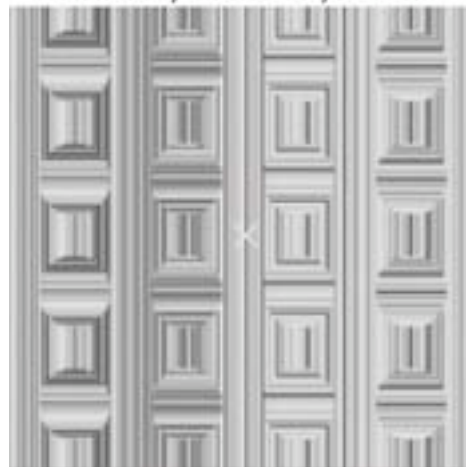

FRONTCOUNTRY GUIDELINES



Plan Ahead

Watch for hazards and follow all the rules of the park or outdoor facility. Remember proper clothing, sunscreen, hats, first aid kits, and plenty of drinking water. Use the buddy system. Make sure you carry your family's name, phone number, and address.

Stick to Trails

Stay on marked trails whenever possible. Short-cutting trails causes the soil to wear away or to be packed, which eventually kills trees and other vegetation. Trampled wildflowers and vegetation take years to recover. Stick to trails!

Manage Your Pet

Managing your pet will keep people, dogs, livestock, and wildlife from feeling threatened. Make sure your pet is on a leash or controlled at all times. Do not let your pet approach or chase

wildlife. When animals are chased or disturbed, they change eating patterns and use more energy that may result in poor health or death.

Take care of your pet's waste. Take a small shovel or scoop and a pick-up bag to pick up your pet's waste wherever it's left. Place the waste bags in a trash can for disposal.

Leave What you Find

When visiting any outdoor area, try to leave it the same as you find it. The less impact we each make, the longer we will enjoy what we have. Even picking flowers denies others the opportunity to see them and reduces seeds, which means fewer plants next year.

Use established restrooms. Graffiti and vandalism have no place anywhere, and they spoil the experience for others. Leave

your mark by doing an approved conservation project.

Respect Other Visitors

Expect to meet other visitors. Be courteous and make room for others. Control your speed when biking or running. Pass with care and let others know before you pass. Avoid disturbing others by making noise or playing loud music.

Respect "No Trespassing" signs. If property boundaries are unclear, do not enter the area.

Trash your Trash

Make sure all trash is put in a bag or trash receptacle. Trash is unsightly and ruins everyone's outdoor experience. Your trash can kill wildlife. Even materials, such as orange peels, apple cores and food scraps, take years to break down and may attract unwanted pests that could become a problem.

How Long Does it Last? Packing out trash is increasingly important as greater numbers of people visit the backcountry. Here are some estimated life expectancies for different kinds of litter.

- * Paper: 2-4 Weeks
- * Banana Peel: 3-5 Weeks
- * Wool Cap: 1 Year
- * Cigarette Butt: 2-5 Years
- * Disposable Diaper: 10-20 Years
- * Hard Plastic Container: 20-30 Years
- * Rubber Boot Sole: 50-80 Years
- * Tin Can: 80-100 Years
- * Aluminum Can: 200-400 Years
- * Plastic 6-pack Holder: 450 Years
- * Glass Bottles: Lots and Lots of Years.

Think before you throw.

Remember to Pack it In, Pack it Out, and Recycle.

As more people use parks and recreation facilities, LEAVE NO TRACE® guidelines become even more important for outdoor visitors.

Leave No Trace is a plan that helps people to be more concerned about their environment and to help them protect it for future generations. Leave No Trace applies in a backyard or local park (front-country) as much as it does in the wilderness (back-country).

We should practice Leave No Trace in our attitude and actions--wherever we go. Understanding nature strengthens our respect toward the environment. One person with thoughtless behavior or one shortcut on a trail can spoil the outdoor experience for others.

Help protect the environment by remembering that while you are there, you are a visitor. When you visit the outdoors, take special care of the area. Leave everything just as you find it.

Hiking and camping without a trace are signs of a considerate outdoors-man who cares for the environment. Travel lightly on the land.

Cub Scouting's Leave No Trace Awareness Award

1. Discuss with your leader or parent/guardian the importance of the Leave No Trace front-country guidelines.
2. On three separate outings, practice the front-country guidelines of Leave No Trace.
3. Boys in a Tiger Cub den complete the activities for Achievement 5, Let's Go Outdoors; boys in a Wolf den complete Requirement 7, Your Living World; boys in a Bear den complete Requirement 12, Family Outdoor Adventures; boys in a Webelos den earn the Outdoors-man activity badge.
4. Participate in a Leave No Trace-related service project.
5. Promise to practice the Leave No Trace front-country guidelines by signing the Cub Scout Leave No Trace Pledge.
6. Draw a poster to illustrate the Leave No Trace front-country guidelines and display it at a pack meeting.

Want to do more? Take the Pledge!

You can take the pledge to practice the Leave No Trace front-country guidelines wherever you go. Just review the guidelines and promise to practice them in your front-country outings.

Pack 567 TIME FOR A TRACK "CHANGE"!

WE'RE THREE WEEKS INTO OUR PACK PENNY CHALLENGE...



You might be asking, what is a Penny Challenge? (where have you been?)
It is a spirited game of friendly competition between the dens. The Scouts not only have fun, they also are raising money for their new Pack Pinewood Derby track.

Object of the game: each den collects as many "PENNIES" (pennies, cash, and checks) as possible during the "challenge" while simultaneously "sabotaging" the other dens with "SILVER" (nickels, dimes, and quarters) Of course, the ultimate object of the game is to give the Scouts an opportunity to raise money for their own Pinewood Derby Track.

COME ON PACK 567, IT'S TIME FOR A TRACK "CHANGE"...WE ARE SO CLOSE!

PENNY CHALLENGE UPDATE:

Den 4 is in 1st place (4139)

They did get sabotaged early, but they fought back and it is not going to hurt them if they keep their penny collection up.

Den 2 is in 2nd place (3176)

Their plan appears to be to sabotage others and get the points up early so they can rise to the top. Keep that in mind as the weeks progress.

Den 1 is in 3rd place (-693)

They need to bring in those pennies to bring their points up. Time to strategize for the win.

Den 5 is in last place (-1394)

Maybe someone from the den should walk around with the den container and ask people "Got any change?" - just a thought.

*Has anyone thought to ask someone to be a sponsor (parent, relative, neighbor, or even a business)?
They might want to match our funds raised or contribute to our track?*

The winning den will be the first Scouts to run their Pinewood Derby cars down the new track! Once the track is ordered and delivered we will have a *non-competitive* Pinewood Derby Race and christen our new track. The winning Scouts will also be treated to ice cream sundaes to celebrate!

Our 2009 Pinewood Derby raised \$1100 for our new track, Congratulations Pack 567! After only 3 weeks of our Penny Challenge, we raised about \$350. We only need \$150 - \$250 to order our track.

Get excited, get involved, and keep making this an exciting competition...in the end, everyone wins! So, bring your "PENNIES" for your team and your "SILVER" to sabotage the other dens.

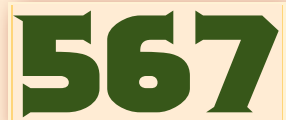

There is a copy of "It Happened to Me" on DVD which will be available to check out from the Information Table. This is an excellent resource that explains some practical steps at teaching stranger danger, personal privacy, how to defend from a predator and more. I have viewed this with my family and found it an excellent training opportunity and a great way to start a conversation that could otherwise be awkward and difficult.

Why we do fundraising

The Pack spends significantly more money per Scout than we collect in membership dues. The remainder of the cost is paid for through fundraising. If we did not do any fundraising, parents would have to pay for all the awards and supplies. (About \$120 per Scout per year)

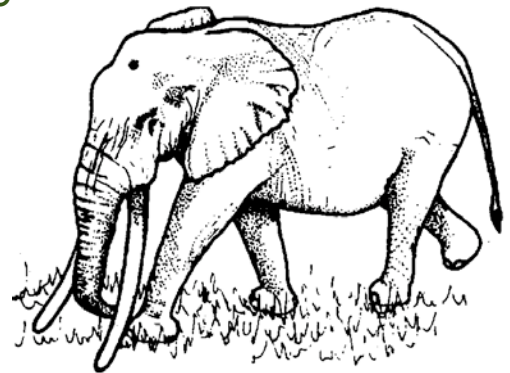
